RECOMMENDED ROOM SET UP

- A Think about using a different room or space from your usual classes to give your students a sense that this is a special event have you got a space with lounges or even beanbags? Could you create a 'startup coworking space' or movie theatre vibe? If it's a small group, maybe set up boardroom style to create a professional atmosphere? Or use a space in a senior or other campus to create a sense of occasion.
- A You'll be getting up off your seats, so be sure to choose a room with enough space for students to move around.
- A If you have a large number of students engaging in the event (100+), we recommend that you separate students into groups of 30-50 rather than have 100+ students in a single auditorium. Experience shows us that engagement is higher when students tap into our events in class size numbers.

MATERIALS REQUIRED

- There will be some fast and furious ideation activities we suggest having a stack of Post-It notes, butcher's paper, whiteboards or similar available to 'dump' ideas together as a class or in groups (depending on the number of students).
- Consider getting some micro prizes to celebrate or acknowledge creativity, ideation or collaboration on the day with 'on the spot' rewards.
- Considering bringing in snacks/drinks for the breaks to make the day feel special.
- Students will need:
 - o Pen & paper
 - o Water bottle
 - o An open mind and sense of curiosity
 - Access to an internet connected device (if possible)

PRE-EVENT ACTIVITY (45 MINS - 1 HOUR)

- 1. Separate students into groups of 4-6 and allocate each group one of the event speakers:
 - Andre Eikmeier Good Empire
 - Doha Khan School Strike 4 Climate
 - Noah Pronk Sticky Pronk
 - Skye Riggs Ripple
 - Isabella Taylor Inspired By
- 2. Have groups research the speaker and fill in a Catalyst Map (download PDF here).
- 3. Have groups present their Catalyst Maps back to the class



POST-EVENT ACTIVITIES (45 MINS - 1 HOUR)

At the conclusion of the Bright Ideas Summit, students will have worked in small teams of 3-6 students to ideate, prototype and write the (elevator) pitch for an innovative idea. Feel free to choose any number of the options below for the final hour of the day.

OPTION 1

- 1. Group 3-4 teams together.
- 2. Have each team Elevator Pitch their idea to the other 2-3 teams they have been grouped with.
- 3. Have the 2-3 teams that are observing the pitching team write down feedback for the team on their idea using the frames, "I like..." to explain what they like about the idea (positive feedback) and "I wonder..." to offer constructive feedback on the idea.

OPTION 2

For a fun an engaging 45-minute lesson on design thinking, try the <u>Marshmallow Challenge</u>. There's even a TED Talk you can show students, along with some reflection questions.

OPTION 3

- 1. Watch one of the Pitch Videos from the Future Anything Grand Final from our website at www.futureanything.com/enterprises.
- 2. In pairs or groups of three, have students respond to the pitch by answering the following questions:
 - What is the problem that the entrepreneur is solving?
 - What is their solution?
 - A How is their solution unique or different?
 - Mow does the business make money?
 - Mhat are two questions that you would like to ask the founder?
 - Mow could you make the idea better? Ideate 2-3 ways that you could make the idea more innovative, financially sustainable or scalable.

If students within the class are given different videos to watch, students could present their responses back to the class.
